Fleas Don't Flee From Bay

Area Autums It doesn't get cold enough in the bay area for fleas & ticks to die off. Only consistent temps of 30 or below will do the trick. Though bloodsuckers, they aren't vampires and don't need an invitation to come into your home. If you've ever had a flea infestation then you know

persistent the little buggerowcan be. Not to mention the diseases they can carry (and spread) & the secondary infections they can cause. The best way to avoid the harmful effects of these nasty pests is to prevent them from latching onto your pet in the first place. Talk to one of our Veterinarians to discuss the best option for your pet.

Seasonal Risks

Leptospirosis: With the rainy season upon us, the likelihood of increased Lepto cases in the Bay Area tend to rise. Lepto is a zoonotic bacterial infection passed through the urine of mammals primarily affecting the liver and kidneys. Your pet is at higher risk for Leptospirosis if they regularly drink or swim in



places that wildlife (rats, opossums, raccoons, squirrels etc...) have access to. This includes puddles and water fixtures you may have in your neighborhood or even backyard. Current research shows vaccinating your dog for Lepto can provide up to 84% protection.



Stuff Your Turkey Not Your Pet

With Thanksgiving just around the corner you may be tempted to include your pet in the festivities by sharing your traditional delicacies with them. This is a dangerous game, as many of the foods we know and love can be hazardous to our furry friends.

Turkey skin, for instance, is high in hard-to-digest fats; cooked turkey and ham bones can splinter in your pets digestive tract; onions & garlic contain toxic sulfides that lead to anemia; Nutmeg is a popular spice added to sweet potatoes & pumpkin pie but can cause seizures & nervous system problems if ingested by your pooch. If you think your pet has ingested one of these holiday toxins, PLEASE CALL Animal Poison control at 1(888) 426-4435. If you have a Home Again Microchip membership the call is free.
